Participatory budgeting and citizens

The Project

Participatory budgeting (PB) is the participation of non-elected citizens to the allocation of public funds. This means that citizens, usually in a municipality setting, can propose projects and take a vote.

Computer Science has formal ideas about fairness in this process and in the methods used to determine the election outcome (voting rules). The purpose of CitizenPB is to determine what ideas of fairness citizens care about with regards to the PB process and PB voting rules.
